The Quest by Judy Mitchell



The first time I consulted a Master Gardener, I wanted advice on selecting a shade tree for my backyard. That was many years ago. The City had just taken down my boulevard tree, an elm, leaving my small urban yard in full sun. I received some fairly good advice that day and I suspect a lot of my neighbors got the same advice: consider crabapple, maple or evergreen trees. The neighborhood is full of them now.

For a novice gardener, it was helpful to be given a limited number of trees to consider, trees with striking differences. Crabapples are small trees that bear spring flowers, fruit for the birds and colorful fall foliage. They are well suited to a small urban garden. Maples are much larger trees. They grow fast and provide the dense shade I thought I wanted. Evergreen trees provide dense shade, require little maintenance, and offer winter interest.

Although I received useful advice all those years ago, we can do better today. We have **UWEX Lawn & Garden Publication A3067, Selecting, Planting and Caring for your Shade Trees**, available at the Learning Store <https://learningstore.uwex.edu>

This month I recommend reading **A3067**. It is a great publication that will help people shopping for a shade tree. It offers eight questions to consider. Armed with the answers, a person will be able to explain their site to someone helping them at a nursery: my backyard has good drainage, it is about 40'X40', I plan to plant the tree between my garage and my neighbor's garage, and the overhead power lines are about 15' south of where I want to plant the tree. This will be incredibly useful information for selecting the right plant for the right place.

If I were to consider changing anything about this publication, I would add a question about the type of shade desired: dappled or deep shade. The answer might lead people to select a tree that gives them more satisfaction in the long run. Many of my former neighbors planted maple trees. They now have dense shade, sparse grass and lots of hostas. I prefer to garden under dappled shade myself.

This publication contains a reference to **Publication A2865, A Guide to Selecting Landscape Plants in Wisconsin**. I could not find A2865 using the Learning Store index but I did find it with an internet search (<http://learningstore.uwex.edu/Assets/pdfs/A2865.pdf>). I think it may have been replaced at the Learning Store with **Lawn & Garden Publication A3864, Choosing the Right Landscape Plants: Factors to Consider**. It covers some of the same material.

Bits & Pieces

Snickerdoodle Apple Pie Apple Cups

(recipes from Judi Robison)

Ingredients:

- 1 cup unsalted butter softened to room temperature
- 1 1/3 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 3 tsp cream of tarter 1 tsp baking soda
- 2 1/2 tsps. Cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 can apple pie filling (or Lori's homemade filling)

Instructions:

1. Make the topping by mixing the sugar and cinnamon together and set aside.
2. Cream the butter and sugar together with a mixer until fluffy (1-2 minutes). Mix in egg and vanilla and set aside.
3. In another bowl whisk together flour, cream of tarter, baking soda, cinnamon and salt. Slowly add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and mix together on low until well combined.
4. Using a tablespoon cookie scoop, scoop out dough into 36 balls. Roll each ball into the cinnamon-sugar mixture and place into a well-greased mini-muffin pan.
5. Bake for about 12 minutes at 350 degrees or until the edges turn slightly golden brown. After removing from the oven make an indentation cookie with a tablespoon (if a tablespoon seems to large try a 1/2 tbsp or 3/4 tbsp size. After cooling 3-5 minutes use a knife to gently pop the cookie out of the pan and place on a wire cooling rack.
6. Prepare the apple pie filling by chopping up the apples in the filling into fine pieces. Use a tbsps. sized cookie scoop in to each of the cookie cups. If desired sprinkle some of the remaining sugar/cinnamon mix on top of the apple mix.

Topping:

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 tsp cinnamon



Homemade Apple Pie Filling

Homemade Apple Pie Filling – this easy recipe takes just a few minutes and tastes so much better than canned pie filling. Keep it in your freezer for when you want pie filling ASAP! Makes 6 cups. (Recipe author is Dorothy Kern)

Ingredients:

- 4 cups apples, peeled, cored and diced
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 3 cups water
- 1 1/3 cups granulated sugar
- 1/3 cup cornstarch
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg



Instructions:

1. Place apples in a large bowl and toss with lemon juice.
2. Place water, sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, salt and nutmeg in a medium saucepan. Stir to combine then bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring often. Once the mixture boils, boil it for two minutes. Add the apples, turn to a simmer and cover. Cook, stirring often, until the apples soften - about 5-8 minutes.
3. Pour into jars to cool to room temperature, then cover and refrigerate. The mixture will thicken more as it cools.
